The purpose of this booklet is to provide you with plenty of information to help put your mind at ease for the upcoming transition of your child's education at Bournville School.

In normal circumstances we would be inviting your child to join us for a transition day but unfortunately this event cannot take place this year.

We will communicate with you via letters and emails as more guidance is released about how we can support your child's transition safely.

We look forward to meeting you all in the near future.

Your child is probably quite nervous about starting secondary school, but at Bournville, we do many things to make the transition as smooth as possible.

Some of the initiatives we use to settle our new students are:

- Separate Year 7 zones around the school site at social times.
- Year 7 students are allocated toilet facilities which only they can use.
- The HUB is a quiet space which Year 7 can visit during social times, or before or after school.
- Year 7 students are sent to lunch 10 minutes earlier than the rest of the school for the first two weeks in September.
- Student ambassadors and prefects are always around the school site ready to help Year 7 find their way to different classrooms.



Our main focus is that all students enjoy their time whilst at Bournville School. As a school we offer a variety of opportunities to all students to participate in away from their typical academic lessons.

At Bournville, all students are placed into a house. We have different houses which are named after local heroes that have contributed to the success of the West Midlands. The houses are Boulton. At Bournville, the students are allocated a form group which contains students within their year group. Students spend the first 20 minutes of every school day with their form tutor, who is able to build a relationship with pupils and become the first point of contact for dealing with any pastoral issues.

ECIAL EDUCATIONAL NEEDS



Did you know that 49% of children and young people think that reading is boring or that there is significant correlation between reading enjoyment, reading frequency and reading attainment?

The 'National Literacy Trust' found that 90% of students who only read books at school are either average or below average readers. They go on to say that: "Children who read for pleasure enjoy better opportunities throughout life because they have gained a richer vocabulary, more knowledge, critical thinkina skills self-directed and a learning framework."

At Bournville, we have the facilities to improve the reading of every child in the school, but we also need your support. From enjoying family reading time, discussing and reflecting on books you've read together and listening to audio books, there are so many ways that you and your children can enjoy the reading experience.

One in five young people are still entering the workplace without the numeracy skills they need for success. We understand that as a parent/carer you want the best for your child and there are lots of ways you can support his/her numeracy skills at home.

Times tables are a fundamental part of everything that follows in Mathematicss: a child who is confident with his/her times tables is auicker and more confident with the rest of his/ her Mathematics. You can help your child by traditional methods such as chanting or testing. Additionally, you can play games to strengthen his/ her skills or your child can help you in planning a journey, work out the cooking times for a roast dinner or totaling up your weekly shop at the supermarket. These will aid to improving your child's numeracy skills and help him/ her to see the mathematical links within everyday life.

LITERACY AND NUMERAC

Bournville School aims to provide the highest quality education by maintaining a disciplined, caring environment in which teachers can teach and pupils can learn. Our Behaviour Policy rests on a set of shared values:

- The right of all members of the School and wider community to be treated with dignity and respect
- The right of all members of the School and wider community to work in a clean, well- resourced and well-cared for physical environment
- The right of all members of the School and wider community to be safe and secure at all times from any threat to their personal well-being
- We recognise that students thrive on praise, the thrill of success and the glow of recognition.



Mobile phones should be turned off and put away before entering school

Mobile phones should be turned off and put away before entering school gates and only switched on after leaving school premises. Confiscated mobile phones can only be collected from Reception by parents/cares at the end of the school day.

REWARDS

A variety of methods of rewards exist at Bournville School which include:

- Verbal praise
- Subject certificates
- Postcards home
- Queue Jump Pass for the term
- Hot chocolate Fridays
- Acknowledgement through assemblies in a roll call of honour
- Positive phone call home
- Public display of high-quality work
- Awards evening

We ensure that students learn by insisting on three simple school rules, these are that students should always be ready, respectful and safe. 'Ready' means that students are at lessons on time with both the uniform and focus that communicates they're ready to learn. 'Respectful' means treating colleagues and staff with appropriate courtesy and 'safe' refers to behaviour that avoids harming themselves, other and the school site.

When teachers encounter behaviour that shows students aren't ready, respectful or safe, teachers will use de-escalation strategies alongside the following staged process:

Level 1 – first verbal warning

Level 2 - second verbal warning

Level 3 – 20 minutes same day detention

Level 4 – 40 minutes same day detention

All detentions are accompanied by a restorative conversation that are intended to improve behaviour rather that simply punish it."

Bournville is committed to maximising the attendance of all students during their education at the school. Students with frequent absences are being denied equality of opportunity.

Attendance is inextricably linked to success in all aspects of school life, including examinations, and regular school attendance is vital if students are to benefit from the experiences which the school offers them. Employers and other reference seekers value attendance and punctuality highly as an indicator of reliability.

ATTENDANCE

Parents/carers are reminded that the only acceptable reason for a student's absence is illness. If your child is unwell, please contact the school by 8:30am on the day of the absence. All unreported absences will receive an automated message informing you of your child's absence. We feel that this not only helps to ensure your child's safety at all times, but also helps improve school attendance.

Poor attendance will be investigated by our Attendance Officer who works closely with the School Police Liaison Officer, the Education Welfare Officer and Pupil Watch. Truancy is always noticed and will not be tolerated in any way. Please note that for safety reasons, students are not permitted to go home during break/lunch times.

LEAVE IN TERM TIME

The Government, Local Authority and Bournville are working to stop unnecessary absences, especially term time holidays, as this disrupts learning. Head Teacher is unable to authorise leave during term time except where there are exceptional circumstances.

Parents/carers must complete an 'Exceptional Leave in Term Time Request Form' if they are considering taking their child out of school for a period of leave. These forms can be collected from Reception and must be returned to the Attendance Officer. Any holidays taken during term time, without permission will be recorded as 'unauthorised' and legal implications could occur.

Parents/carers are required to inform the Attendance Officer of medical and dental appointments in advance. We ask parents/ carers to try to ensure that appointments are made outside of school hours, wherever possible. Parents/carers are also asked to ensure that, if appointments in school time are unavoidable, students attend school prior to the appointment and are returned to school afterwards. Please provide advance notice for any medical appointment that is made for your child during the school day.

PUNCTUALITY

Students who arrive late to school between the times of 8:40am and 9:00am will be met by a member of the Senior Leadership Team and given a same day detention.

Students that arrive to school after 8:40am must report and sign in at the main reception. Those students with no reasonable explanation for arriving after 9:30am will receive a 'U' code (unauthorised late after AM registration) for that am registration mark. Once a student receives

20 'U' codes, legal action may be started by the Educational Welfare Officer.

Consequences will be issued to students who are late for their 8:40am registration.

Bournville School is committed to the highest standards in protecting the children entrusted to our care. We recognise that some children may be the victims of bullying, neglect, physical, sexual and emotional abuse. Staff working with the children are well placed to identify such abuse.

What will we do if we have a concern about your child?

If we are concerned that your child may be at risk of abuse or neglect we must follow the procedures in our Safeguarding and Child Protection Policy. A copy of this can be found on our web site.

The procedures have been written to protect all students; they comply with our statutory responsibilities and are designed to support students, families and staff. The procedures are based on the principle that the welfare of the child is the most important consideration.

In almost all circumstances, we will speak to you about our concerns as well as inform you if we feel we must refer our concerns to the Children's Social Care Team. We will request for your consent to put forward a referral, but in some circumstances we may need to make the referral against your wishes. We will only do this

if we aenuinely believe that this is the best way to protect your child, and it will be recorded that you did not provide consent for the referral. If we determine that contactina vou in the first instance may ieopardize the situation, we will report our concerns to the Children's Social Care Team and await further advice. We will normally tell you that a referral is being made and will record the reasons why we decided to follow this course of action.

All child protection records are kept securely and filed separately from your child's general school file. The only staff that have access to these records are those who need to be informed about the concerns in order to protect and support your child.

Child protection is an extremely sensitive issue; it raises many questions and a range of strong emotions. We will ensure we do everything we possibly can to support our students and would like to assure you that any action taken will be in the best interests of your child.

At the beginning of the year you will receive a list of important dates which will include:

- Year 7 Information Evening.
- A parent meeting with subject teachers in the spring term.
- A full report towards the end of the summer term which summarises progress and targets for improvement.
- Predicted Attainment Grades (PAGs) which are published throughout the year together with Effort Scores.

MUSIC TUITION

Students receive one hour of Music per week as part of their curriculum entitlement. In addition to this, we also work with S4E Music in order to provide instrument lessons to students.
