#### **New Canteen Provision**

Bournville School has totally revamped its lunchtimes! Since the start of the spring term, lunchtimes are now split to ensure pupils have a better experience in the middle of the day. On first lunch we have Year 11 and Year 7 and on the second lunch we have Years 8, 9 and 10. This means that lunchtimes are less busy and calmer to allow pupils to enjoy their social time with their friends. In a recent Student Voice, one pupil commented that 'there is more space outside now for us as there are less students. Another pupil said 'I think it is much easier with the new system to get food because the queue gets through much quicker.'

Another major contributing factor to a happier lunchtime experience, are our new caterers! The new menu has gone down a storm. Although some pupils miss the old chicken nuggets, the food on offer is healthy and



vibrant. One pupil in Year 7 said 'I have spotted two of the new caterers and they are amazing! Plus, the portion sizes are much better!' With changes to the lunchtime

In January 2023, twelve Bournville students descended on **Jamie's Farm**-Hereford. Jen Pakes-Pastoral approached the charity late in 2022 to see whether it would be possible to take some students to experience a week of outdoor adventure and self-discovery.

The school set about choosing twelve students who they felt would gain the most from this experience. There was much excitement from both staff and students as they approached the farm house. No phones, sugar or TV for a week. How would they all cope! All worries were set aside with the warm and inviting welcome from Jamie's staff.

Nestled in sleepy Hereford, surrounding by hills and wildlife, Jamie's Farm was the perfect location to

explore new skills and for the students to really get out of their comfort zones and challenge themselves. The days are structured around working on the farm, learning new skills, cooking for the group, therapy, games and hikes.

The students took to all the tasks and challenges with ease. The farm staff remarked that they'd never seen such poor weather and that our students showed remarkable resilience throughout a tough (and often smelly!) week. It's no mean feat mucking out pigs before breakfast! Prior to going, some of our young people lacked in self-esteem, they felt unsuccessful and demotivated. However, after five days of fresh air, positive affirmations and spending time with nature, our young people started to believe in themselves.

As staff members we left feeling equipped with a wider range of resources to support these students in the classroom and beyond. An unforgettable experience had by all!

Work Experience has been lauched for our Y10 students and university visits organised for our Y9 cohort. In tutor time 'Guess My Job' has been relaunched, to give students an insight into a variety of careers, the use of Unifrog encouraged and Mrs Field continues to source unique engaging experiences. the BBC as part of their 'Share Your Story' initiative.


Art- Spring 1 Excellent Work Year 7- Abigail Howard

Year 11-Sofia Gmizovic


Sofia explored the theme of 'our world' for her coursework.

## Technology - Spring 1 Excellent Work



### Year 7 Textiles

Year 7 have enjoyed the start of their textiles lesson. They have started to look at what is textiles and the importance of design when starting a project.

They have created some fantastic cross-stitch bookmarks. Practising their hand stitching in preparation for their next project of a pencil case.

## Year 7 Food Technology

Year 7 have had a mixture of theory and practical lessons. Looking at the importance of personal hygiene and safety when preparing food and why people follow the Eat Well Guide to live a healthy and balanced diet. In their practical lessons they have created some wonderful dishes such as mini pizzas, fruit smoothies and apple crumble.





## Year 8 Food Technology

Year 8 have had a mixture of theory and practical lessons. Looking at the micronutrients and macronutrients in their theory lessons. They are also learning the need of good food safety in food technology. In their practical lessons they have created some amazing flapjack, shaped breads and calzones.



## Year 9 Food Technology

Year 9 have had a focus on food choices, looking at how age, religion, lifestyle and speciality diets can influence someone's everyday diet. Also looking at food science in connection to GCSE food preparation and nutrition.

They have worked really hard in their practical lessons making scones, pizza pinwheels and palmiers.

## Year 10 Food Technology

GCSE food preparation and nutrition groups have had a focus of healthy eating and food choice this half term. They have started to complete exam style questions in preparation for the GCSE mocks. They have created some high skill cooking, making cheesecake, chicken Kiev, jam tarts, ratatouille and two layered Victoria sponge cake.



## Spanish Trip

On Thursday 16<sup>th</sup> February a group of year 10 students went to King Edward VI Lordswood School for Girls to watch a theatre performance. This was organised by the Oaks Collegiate.
