

Principal's Message

As you will see from this issue of "In the Know" it's been another eventful half term. What has been most notable has been how positive the culture across the school has been with students demonstrating the high standards expected of them at Bournville. All students have come back showing their dedication to their studies and they have been working extremely hard.

The term started off with our new year 7's joining us and launching the NHS researcher's project. This has involved the year 7's working with NHS professionals learning how to do market research for the NHS. To date they have had two sessions and are now working on a key question to help doctors, surgeons and clinicians with their work. This will lead to them presenting their findings to clinicians and paediatricians in the next half term at the Children's Hospital in Birmingham. This may be the start of the careers of future doctors, dentists and surgeons!

Our open evenings welcomed the prospective students of the future, and these events were so well received we have had to put on additional open mornings due to popular demand. I look forward to these future students joining us and following in the footsteps of our current year 7's NHS researchers. Once again, our year 8 students have had a fantastic day at the Black Country Living Museum where they have got to experience the Black Country of yesteryear and explored history, from the Industrial Revolution to post-war as well as going underground in a drift mine.

Unpredictably the British weather decided to send a flood to the school as well, interrupting the year 11 parents evening and the MacMillan Coffee morning planned in secondary. However, the weather was not going to stop us, and I want to thank all those parents who supported our Macmillan coffee morning in primary raising £150 for the charity. Likewise, thank you to all those year 11 parents who came to the rescheduled parents evening on 17^{th} October. This was a very fruitful evening, and I wanted to thank you all for your positive feedback.

Our year 11 students have been working extremely hard as they prepare for their next set of Mock exams in November. To help them with their applications to colleges and sixth forms they have already had a series of careers events with Cadbury College and UCB visiting promoting their A-level and technical courses. This week there will be almost 40 different employers coming in supporting our Careers Fayre where students meet and see what the future could hold and what they would need to achieve in their studies to get there. Year 10 Art students have visited the Barber Institute Art. Our enrichment programme has extended further this year with morning session in PE running between 8.00am and 8:30 am. Almost 27 children are now arriving early to take part in the morning activities before they start their school day. Our parents' forum continues go from strength to strength and be a positive collaboration supporting the school as we continue to drive for excellence.



English

Pupils have started the year in English very well, with pupils in key stage three excelling in creative writing and fiction analysis, whilst key stage four pupils have continued their GCSE literature studies through their study of A Christmas Carol (Year 10) and Macbeth (Year 11). Year 7 have made the

transition into secondary school with their study of Ghost Boys. We have been very impressed with how articulate and passionate Year 7 have been with their engagement around issues of protest and injustice in the novel. We look forward to channelling these passions further as we study topical issues in Birmingham, Britain, and Beyond next half term. Year 8 have enjoyed their work on the gothic genre. We have seen some outstanding gothic stories and descriptions from our writers, who now go on to study the play version of Noughts and Crosses by Malorie Blackman. Year 9 have deeply considered the ways in which language and ideology can be expressed through their study of dystopian fiction. Pupils have studied a range of dystopian texts and have created their own dystopian stories. We have been very impressed with their understanding of how language can carry power – an idea pupils will continue to understand as they study Animal Farm by George Orwell next half term.





Year 10 and 11 pupils have completed their first milestone assessments of the year. They have reflected well on the feedback given, and we have seen an impressive determination from many pupils to improve their work, extend their understanding, and gain more marks in the subsequent essay responses they have produced. We know this resilience and determination is what will push them to excellent results. We are also very much looking forward to our trip with Year 10 to see A Christmas Carol performed at the Birmingham Rep theatre at the start of December and have booked a performance of An Inspector Calls to be performed in school after Christmas.

Finally, all English staff have been immensely impressed with the efforts pupils have made with homework this year. We have found that our homework booklets have made communication very clear, and pupils are working really well at home. Thank you for continuing to support your child's education at home. We are continuing to reward pupils with postcards, certificates, and golden tickets, and have been very pleased to reward so much fantastic work.

Business and Computer Science

As we approach the half-term break, I'd like to update you on some exciting progress within our Business and Computer Science groups. Year 11 pupils have been working diligently in preparation for their upcoming mock exams in November. There is a wealth of material available for revision on Microsoft Teams. Year 10 – Understanding Data Representation	Our Year 10 Computer Science group has been focused on the fascinating topic of data representation. They have been learning how information is presented, particularly in images and sound, which will build a solid foundation for their ongoing studies.
Year 9 – Exploring Computer Devices and Binary	Year 9 pupils have been studying input, output, and storage devices, enhancing their understanding of how computers interact with the physical world. They've also begun tackling binary conversion and adding numbers in binary, a fundamental concept in Computer Science.
Year 8 – Parts of a Computer	Year 8 students have impressed us with their hard work in exploring the functions of different parts of a computer. They've drawn some excellent comparisons, linking computer components to parts of the human body, making their learning both engaging and memorable.
Year 7 – Healthy Eating Presentations	Our Year 7 pupils have truly outshone themselves this term. Their PowerPoint presentations on healthy eating and lifestyles have been outstanding, filled with creativity and detailed information. It's fantastic to see such commitment from our youngest learners!

Year 10 gallery visit- The Barber Institute of Fine Art

On Thursday 17th October our Year 10 GCSE Art students had the opportunity to The Barber Institute of Fine Arts on the University of Birmingham campus.

We were privileged to have an informative guided tour around the galleries. Our guide firstly taught us how to read an artwork and how we should give artworks time to fully understand them. We were told some facts about the history of oil painting such as how natural ultramarine pigment was made from ground lapis lazuli. During the Middle Ages and Renaissance, it was the most expensive pigment available (gold being second) and was often reserved for depicting the robes of Angels and there are many examples of this at the gallery.

We were also lucky enough to see the new exhibition 'Scent and the Art of the Pre Raphaelites' which combined famous artworks with fragrances. All students enjoyed the sensory interactive experience.



Students enjoyed some independent study time so they could look in more depth at artwork of their choice. We take our photographs, sketches and ideas back to the classroom, they will help the students to develop their own ideas. All students behaved impeccably, contributed to discussions and asked lots of questions and we hope to have more art trips in 2025.


