We appreciate we may be a little annoying at times but we are motivated by kind hearts and desire to see your child settled at school.

Bonfire Night

Here are some tips for keeping children safe on Bonfire Night and a video for them to watch <u>Bonfire</u> <u>Night Safety | Firework Safety for kids!</u> :

- **Supervise children**: Keep children supervised at all times, especially if they are young or might wander off.
- Use a barrier: Use rope or fencing to cordon off the area where fireworks will be lit and the bonfire.
- Wear appropriate clothing: Make sure children don't wear loose or flammable clothing, and tie back their hair.
- Use sparklers safely: Never give sparklers to children under five. If you do use sparklers, make sure to:
 - Wear gloves
 - Hold the sparkler at arm's length
 - Stand still and keep a good distance from other people
 - Put the sparkler in a bucket of cold water when you're done
 - Always light one sparkler at a time
- Keep pets safe: Keep pets indoors and away from windows and blinds while fireworks are going on.
- Put out fireworks safely: If a firework doesn't go off, soak it with water and then dispose of it.

Attendance League Table with Mrs Bharj



Once they had presented their speeches, each class completed their ballot papers and returned them to their class teachers to count!

Our Year 6 pupils have a to go a step further in order to help them transition well to secondary – they were required to

compose their own PowerPoint presentations during their own time (some prepared at home

Reception Class with Miss Bell and Miss Osman



This term we are learning all about the season 'Autumn'. We have been singing the song 'Months of the year' (follow the link: https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=5enDRrWyXaw) and discovering who in our class has a birthday in the months that fall in Autumn. We will continue this throughout the year. We have read a variety of fiction and non-fiction

books and used these to extend our learning. We have been on an Autumn walk and collected a variety of coloured leaves to make our own Leaf Man and used them to create our own story altogether. Here are some examples of what the children said about their Leaf Man:

"I go on holiday two times with my family on an airplane!" "I'm going to a big playground in a big truck and a swing with my Daddy, Mommy and Aunty Sarah!" "I'm going to Greece with my mommy and daddy and going to use my car!" "I want to go outside on an adventure to find some bikes and pretend it's rainbow bikes!"

Children orally composing stories develops their spoken language skills, preparing them for reading and writing. It lays the foundation for character development, and the concept of the beginning, middle and end of stories. It gives them the opportunity to express their emotions, thoughts, and personal experiences as well as enhancing their social interaction and social skills such as listening, turn-taking and empathy. Inventing stories is something we really enjoy doing as a whole class, coming up with fabulous plots and twists to our stories and creating wonderful characters.



We will be continuing our Autumn learning using all our five senses to extend our vocabulary and look forward to sharing our next class story with you.

Weekly Family Read Sessions

It is always so good to see as many of you that can attend. Reminder, sessions are held from 2.30pm to 3.00pm every Wednesday.

Year 1 with Mrs Clay and Miss Hutchison

In Year One we have been developing the use of the different areas of the classroom. In our reading corner we have plenty of cushions so that we can read our books quietly. We have enjoyed designing and making models for our creative area and



even learned how to use split pins to add a moving part to our



models. The role play area has now become a café. We used our phonics to create menus and have enjoyed using our new props.



We have also continued to develop our knowledge of 'The Great Fire of London' and sequenced the pictures to tell the story of what happened. In our science work, we found out that there are different groups of animals, and we sorted pictures into the correct groups. Did you know that humans are mammals?



Year 2 and Year 3 Science with Miss McLynskey - Exploring the Human Body!

This term, Year 2 and Year 3 have been diving into the fascinating world of the human body in their science lessons! Recently, we've been focusing on the importance of muscles in how our bodies move. The children have been learning how muscles like the biceps and triceps work, and they even created their own model arms!

Using elastic bands to represent the muscles, the children attached them to model bones (the humerus, ulna, and radius) and used a split pin to see how the muscles contract and relax as the arm bends and straightens. It was a great hands-on way for them to understand how muscles work in pairs to help us move.

Year 4 with Miss Heyer, Miss Karimattam and Miss Walker

This term, our focus in science has been on electricity, where the children explored how circuits work by creating their own switches. Using simple materials like card and paperclips, they learned how to connect and disconnect a switch, understanding the critical role it plays in completing a circuit.

In art, we have been studying the work of Jacob Lawrence, particularly his powerful portrayal of the migration experience for Black people. The children had the opportunity to create sketches inspired by Lawrence's unique style, allowing them to explore themes of movement and history while developing their artistic skills.

Year 6 with Miss Withy, Miss Messina and Mrs Hathaway

This month, Year 6 had an exciting opportunity to visit Bewdley Museum for our History trip, where we delved into what life was like during the Blitz in World War II.



One of the most memorable moments was hearing an authentic air raid siren— it was incredibly loud and quite scary!! We also got to examine real gas masks. An interesting, albeit surprising, fact we learned was that the filters in these gas masks, which were meant to protect people from harmful gases, actually contained asbestos, a substance now known to be very dangerous to our lungs. Don't worry—the masks we handled were completely safe, as all harmful filters had been removed. Still, we were quite relieved not to wear them for long, as they were quite uncomfortable!

We were also lucky enough to spend some time in a real air raid shelter, which originally belonged to the Bewdley Post Office. This made it larger than the typical Anderson shelters found in people's homes. We also learnt more about life during the war and experienced the "Make Do and Mend" culture firsthand by trying our hand at making our own rag rugs.

The museum staff were fantastic with so much to show us and tell us about. A great day was had by all.

Year 6 Assembly

Year 6 proudly hosted their first class assembly of the year, and we worked hard to showcase all the incredible learning we've done since September. There was certainly a lot to choose



We shared examples of our writing based on the novel Good Night, Mr Tom, including a moving diary entry from Avie and a vivid character description of William Beech by Cillian. We also presented some of our artwork, inspired by Frida Kahlo, explaining how we used symbolism



to create our pieces, just as Frida did in hers. Thank you to all our artists, including Yehor and Marget who spoke so beautifully about the symbolism in their self-portraits.

To bring some science into the mix, we conducted a live experiment demonstrating refraction, with a parent volunteer expertly helping to explain why the paintbrush appeared to bend when placed in water.



We closed our assembly with a special performance of the E-B-G-B Blues, played by the Year 6 brass orchestra. If you've ever tried to play a brass instrument, you know how challenging it can be—so a huge well done to Year 6 for their perseverance!

It's been a busy and exciting start to the year. I am very proud of Year 6 and all their hard work, and we're only just getting started.

Black History Day - Celebrating Inspirational Figures



On Thursday 24th October, Primary students took part in an exciting day of activities to celebrate Black History Month. Divided into their four teams, students rotated through various stations, learning about inspirational people of colour and exploring themes of equality, resilience, and kindness.

This year, the focus was on Racism in Sport, a Martin Luther King speech and Malala Yousafzai's fight for education for girls.

Reception Class read 'Handa's Surprise', creating their own food basket, discussing the story's themes and acting the story out.

Mrs Clay introduced the significance of Martin Luther King Jr.'s iconic "I Have a Dream" speech, encouraging students to write their own version of the speech, reflecting their hopes for a better world.

Mr. Newton highlighted the 'No Room for Racism' campaign. Students designed posters to promote anti-racism at football games.

Miss Withy led sessions on 'Malala's Magic Pencil' and 'The Proudest Blue', sparking conversations about rights for all, acceptance and bravery reflecting on what they would do if they had a magic pencil.

Miss Heyer's activity involved creating artwork of monumental figures, including Malala (who stood up for education for girls to the Taliban, Martin Luther King Jr who was a key leader in the civil rights movement, Jude Bellingham and Ibtihaj Muhammad.

During breaktime and lunchtime, students enjoyed tasting the fruits from 'Handa's Surprise', adding a fun and flavourful experience to the day.

The day was a wonderful opportunity for students to reflect on the contributions of people of colour and the importance of standing up for equality and justice.
